

Scientific Programme

This year we are delighted to welcome the Royal College of Ophthalmologists as our 2019 guest society; our Tuesday joint session will explore a range of ocular related dermatological diseases and treatments. This will be followed by the Keynote lecture from Dan Morris (UK) talking on The Eye at High Altitude- Tales from Mt Everest.' The Tuesday afternoon plenary also has three other keynote lecturers: Chris Miller (USA) talking on Speciality Site Melanomas; Mike Lewis (UK) on the management of Mouth Ulcers; and the final keynote is Erin Warshaw (USA) presenting on Acrylates.

We continue on Wednesday with the popular Medical Dermatology session, followed by submitted papers session and an afternoon plenary of invited speakers and two further keynotes in: Jie Zheng (China) and Craig Sinclair (Australia) updating us on respectively 'Psoriasis Relapse' and 'Skin Cancer Prevention'. The day ends with a presentation from the Patient Support Groups.

Thursday morning starts with the Professors and Registrars session and an early afternoon plenary of invited speakers. The final part of the afternoon sessions, feature three concurrent sessions: GIRFT and two interactive cases sessions, one from the BSMD and one from the BSDS. As always there are plenty of other sessions and talks of interest taking place in the Special Interest Group session, Hot Topics, Sponsored Symposia and the pre-conference sessions. 




ACC Liverpool Map







Artificial Intelligence is the application of computer and smartphone-based technologies which allow consumers to select cosmetic products which best suit their skin type, or on a more simplistic level, discriminate product selection based on the presence of perceived hazardous substances. Personalised Beauty is an emerging technology by which consumers can 'manufacture' bespoke cosmetic products, most often from the skincare category, in their favourite retail outlet. This concept brings with it challenges for the product regulatory and safety frameworks consequent to the ad hoc nature of product manufacture and delivery. The Microbiome is a relatively 'old' science, recently discovered by the mass beauty industry, with more and more cosmetic companies researching, developing launching products to satisfy a perceived consumer demand. Cutaneous manifestations secondary to paraprotein deposits in the skin include a group of different disorders, which, although rare, may be the first clinical manifestation of the underlying hematologic dyscrasia. We

review the clinical manifestations and the histopathologic findings of the processes that result from specific deposition of the paraprotein in different structures of the skin. Paraneoplastic processes frequently associated with hematologic malignancies will be not covered in this review. Some of the disorders here included result from deposition of the intact paraprotein in the skin, whereas in other cases the lesions are due to deposition of modified paraproteins, in the form of amyloid substance, cryoglobulins or crystalglobulins. 

The recent availability of in-home ultraviolet light kits for acrylic "gel" and "shellac" nails has resulted in sensitization of many consumers. In addition, many recent cases of contact dermatitis to acrylates in glucose sensors have been reported. This presentation will discuss the epidemiology of acrylate sensitivity as well as the newly recognized allergen, isobornyl acrylate, which was just named the American Contact Dermatitis Society Allergen of the Year for 2020.

> Redistribution of Pathogenic IL-17-producing T Cells Provides a Mechanistic Insight Into Psoriasis Relapse

Prof Jie Zheng (Shanghai, China)



The character of psoriasis is always relapsing. Although biologics have revolutionized treatment and care, a significant fraction of psoriatic patients initially respond but lose efficacy and disease recurs like many other medications used for the treatment of psoriasis. Here we report that redistribution of pathogenic IL-17-producing innate T cells play a critical role in this process. RNAseq analysis reveals that chemokine/chemokine receptor expression is drastically altered in psoriatic skin between pre-treated and effectively treated with glucocorticoid (GC) and subsequent relapsed skin. Using imigimod (IMQ)-induced mouse psoriasis-like model, we found that pathogenic IL-17-producing yδT (yδT17) cells are decreased in the skin upon GC treatment but increased in the draining and distant lymph nodes (LN). This effect lasted even two weeks after GC withdrawal. Upon re-challenge with IMQ, these mice developed more severe disease with increased epidermal thickness and massive neutrophil infiltration in the skin. Accordingly, $y\delta T17$ cells are decreased or unchanged in the draining or distant LNs. Redistribution of pathogenic y8T17 cells is CCR6 cells appear to have memory feature. Thus, redistribution of pathogenic IL-17-producing innate T cells is vital to prevent disease relapse in skin inflammation.







Primary infected skin lesions caused by infection with fungi, bacteria or yeast. Rosacea, acne vulgaris or pruritus without inflammation. Special warnings and precautions for use: Antibiotics may cause pseudomembranous colitis which may range in severity from mild to life-threatening. 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
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The designer behind the BAD annual meeting covers and branding






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
